MASS PROPERS FOR LENT VI (Year A)

• The Palm Gospel is proclaimed as usual with lights and incense and the customary responses at beginning and end.

Gospel for the Blessing of Palm: Matthew 21:1-11

First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-7 A Song of the Suffering Servant

Responsorial Psalm: My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6-11 Christ humbled Himself unto death

Gospel Acclamation: Praise to You, O Christ, King of eternal glory! Christ was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised Him high and gave Him the name which is above all names. Praise to You, O Christ, king of eternal glory!

Passion: Matthew: 26:14-27:66 Jesus cried out and yielded His spirit.

• The Passion is proclaimed with neither lights nor incense!

- The Passion is greeted at the beginning and end with respectful silence. NO RESPONSES
- The Passion is long. If standing presents you with challenges, wait until Christ reaches Golgotha to stand.
- When the Passion tell of the death of the Lord, those who can, genuflect.

Communion Antiphon: Father, if this chalice cannot pass without my drinking it, Your will be done

THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK Both the Gospel readings this Sunday (Palms and Passion) contain details which strongly suggest that the events of Holy Week are neither spontaneous or tragic! They are planned by the Lord Himself and His Heavenly Father. The dialogue at the collecting of the donkey sounds like a prearranged code with the owners of the ass. The Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem is no accident or spur of the moment thing. The Old Testament quotation which Matthew includes makes it clear that God's planning of salvation, the golden thread through history, goes back a very long way. It has to be like this! This is not just St Matthew. When St Luke tells of the first Easter Evening and the Walk to Emmaus, the Risen Lord tells Cleopas and his companion (Mrs Cleopas or Mary the wife of Clopas?) that the Christ was destined to suffer, as He tells them about the mentions in Scripture about Himself.

The Passion gospel in Matthew and in the other Evangelists suggests the Lord has pre-planned the Last or Passover Supper. Of course, Jerusalem was heaving with people making plans for the Seder Meal and the Passover Celebration, but for the Saviour it is not Israel's Escape from Egypt when the Angel of Death passed over their houses, but His own Passover from Death to Life, taking us with Him. That He has made His own, particular preparations, is hardly surprising.

I find it helpful to see the planning and preparation of Holy Week and Easter, because part of me just wants to spare Him the suffering and death and cut along to the Resurrection, but that would actually defeat the object of His destiny. I can't change what is supposed to happen. With God's help, I can change me!

'MUSIC AND MOVEMENT' Decades ago, generations of children at Primary School ran round their hall or class room moving to music on the Radio. For some in big cities, this was the only real exercise they had. For most of the Church Year, there is music at Mass, but not much movement. Apart from arriving and departing and going for Holy Communion, it is mostly up and down on the spot. Of course, we kneel for the Consecration at Mass, but it pretty static. In Holy Week that changes. It is week of forward movement both physical and spiritual.

It starts with the Blessing of Palms and the Procession in honour of Christ the King. This usually starts outside or in a building apart from the Parish Church. We move into Mass, not so much in imitation of Christ as with Him in spirit.

There is the journey to the Cathedral for the Chrism Mass, with its blessing of oils and emphasis of Christ the Priest. For us, Bristol is not too far away, but if you are in Mlnehead, Chard or Chipping Campden, the travelling is significant. For our clergy it is the occasion for the renewal of commitment to priestly and diaconal service. The Bishop too commits himself to serve God and the Diocese.

Much of the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper resembles a normal, Sunday morning Mass, but the bells at the Gloria jolt us out of our complacency. The Mass does not end in the usual notices and blessing. The Blessed Sacrament remains on the altar after Holy Communion and we process out of church solemnly to the Altar of Repose, dressed to remind us of the Garden of Gethsemane. It is not joyful. We are sombre, leaving the Upper Room with the Lord to watch and wait, knowing that the Arrest could happen at any moment. It is the opposite of the joy of Corpus Christi, later in the year.

The Celebration of the Passion not only contains the movement of the Faithful to receive Holy Communion. Before that the Cross is processed into the assembly, stopping as it does so for us to adore the Crucified. Then we ourselves process up to venerate.

The Great Paschal Vigil and First Mass of Easter starts with the Procession of the Candle into the darkened church. It reminds us to carry Christ the Light into the world.

With all this movement, small wonder we finish Palm Sunday Mass with "Ride on, Ride on in majesty", for move we must. Its not about the youth or vigour of our bodies, but about spiritually uniting ourselves to Christ in His Passover Mystery.
